From the Desk of Pastor Mark

² I say to the Lord, "You are my Lord;
I have no good apart from you." -- Psalm 16:1-2 (NRSV)

Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

As I type these words, the United States is less than a week removed from having orchestrated a strike against Iranian nuclear facilities. There's been attempted retribution. Ceasefires have been issued between Iran and Israel and those ceasefires have been broken and resumed again. I'll tell you honestly that I don't understand the military, political, economic, or social repercussions of this strike, nor the fallout from it all, so I couldn't tell you what our national or world future holds in relation to this. But what I can tell you is that global diplomacy is fragile and broken right now and people are afraid.

People are afraid of war, of drawing our military personnel into conflict and dangerous situations. People are afraid that Iran or an ally of Iran will successfully retaliate against American civilians or military members stationed in the Middle East. People are afraid that the retaliation may even happen on American soil. People are afraid that the price of oil will spike. People are afraid that dominoes will fall and that the already shaky global economy will collapse. There are a lot of scenarios that are making a lot of people afraid.

Historically, when the American public have become afraid, they have traditionally turned to the Bible, to the church, and to religious leaders to provide guidance and comfort. It is well documented that in the immediate aftermath of 9/11 that church attendance jumped up substantially. People who felt secure prior to these attacks suddenly didn't know who, what or where were safe anymore, apart from religious leaders reciting the comforting words of scripture within the confines of a sanctuary fortress. That was a safe and comforting environment, and so people turned to it.

But, as the trends that had begun in the 1990s when church attendance/membership began to decline, normalcy settled in, and churches once again started to become emptier. And while we may mourn these changes in the church, what we are reminded of in these days is that Christ created His church for such a time as this. The church was not created to boast large memberships; rather, Christ instituted his church

I am prayerfully optimistic that further aggressions can be avoided and discontinued and that we can instead begin to pivot towards peace and love in this world that our God loves so much.

And we, as the church, are invited, as well as commanded, to carry out this very work from within our walls. In encountering the living God in the sacraments, we become responsive recipients of that grace. In the church we will pray for peace. We will sing for peace. We will open scripture and receive the Word of peace that God offers to us. And when we depart from this sanctuary, we will strive to live into that peace that has been made known to us in the love of Jesus Christ.

May God's love be on your hearts and minds and may the peace of God which surpasses all understanding bless you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Grace Historical Dates

- 8-11-1999 Two new cemetery rules signs installed in cemetery.
- 9-12-1999 Tree planted in area between 2 ball diamonds (purple autumn ash). From the penny church and anniversary committee.
- 9-22-1999 Installed rebar in concrete bumpers in south parking lot.
- 10-7-1999 New carpeting installed in dining room and lower hall.
- 10-18-1999 1967 corner stone removed. Box opened by D. Christianson and held until 10-24-1999 presentation of contents.
- 11-1-1999 Decided all nationalities who are Lutherans may become members.
- 11-2-1999 Greg Wisnefske started covering windows with aluminum. Job completed 11-11-1999.
- 1-5-2000 Fire inspection—electrical panels not labeled.
- 3-7-2000 Installed new safe in work room. Bolts through wall. Other safe was stolen.
- 3-28-2000 Project of repairing stained glass windows and installing storm panels on exterior.
- 8-15-2000 Heavy wind damage on property. Trees down.
- -Facts are assembled and submitted by David Christianson, with the help of several people who went through historical materials and pulled out data of note.
