## *From the Desk of Pastor Mark*



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Happy New Year!!

Since I began this call a little over three years ago, I have gone through some changes. Some of the bigger ones are that I have transitioned into my fifties, the last of my children have graduated from high school and my Spotify library and playlist now incorporates NPR podcasts and Americana and folk music. Aches and pains seem to be hanging on a little longer than they used to and I find myself cursing all the reckless drivers that routinely pass me on the highway. I've gone through some changes, I'm still going through changes, and these changes are pretty strong evidence that I'm not getting any younger.

But such is the reality of our mortality. While I am daily reminded that I will not live forever in this world, because of the revelation to the world of our Lord Jesus Christ 2000 years ago, the Day of Epiphany is a beautiful and relevant reminder that I will live forever in the next one,

January 6, the Day of Epiphany on our Christian calendar, signals the conclusion of the 12-day Season of Christmas and transitions us into the aptly named Season of Epiphany, which we will celebrate until Ash Wednesday. The Day of Epiphany is the day on which we commemorate the visit of the magi from the east bearing gifts, before setting out on their return journey in which they would share with the world what they had witnessed. While our English understanding of the word "epiphany" may come across as being an "aha!" moment for the world, a more focused meaning of the Greek word, *epithaneia* (epiphany), means "manifestation," and that gives us greater depth than just being a sudden "aha!" moment.

The dictionary defines *manifestation* as "an event, action, or object that clearly shows or embodies something." It embodies something. That means that it takes on the nature of a being, specifically, our being. In taking on the human flesh and all that is attached to it, the good and the bad alike, Jesus became more than just an "aha!" moment but became a "I know what you're going through because I'm going through it as well" moment for us.

## Grace Historical Dates

1903 Various families of the congregation paid for the other stained glass windows with their names printed on them.

Under the leadership of Pastor O.J. Norby from 1899 to 1912, many meetings in the form of social gatherings, such as box socials, necktie socials, and ice cream socials were held in the Winchester hall. The purpose of those meetings was to raise money to help finance the building of the new church.

On Sunday, May 15, 1904, the present church building was dedicated. With the local pastor, O.J. Norby, twelve pastors took part in the dedication services, with standing room only.

Three services were held on dedication day. The morning service was in Norwegian, the afternoon service in English, and an evening service was dedicated to the young people.

The ladies of the congregation arranged for and served a dinner in the basement, free to all who came.

The offering for the dedication day was almost \$300.

Our church was first named the United Norwegian Evangelical Lutheran Congregation of Winchester.

Membership of the congregation in the early 1900s was 645.
