Peace is something that has eluded our world for thousands of years and 2025 has been no different. Global conflicts continue to rage. Our own country continues to be sharply divided on many issues. Families and neighbors' squabble over trivial things. Even individuals are torn as personal choices may lead to doors closing behind them. Peace is something that remains elusive on so many levels.

And yet that is a name that we attach to the Christ child. It seems that peace is even impossible within the Christian faith.

#### On the Road . . .

. . . With Bruce and Kathy Hergert

In September we went to Moinesti, Romania to work on a 4-plex apartment building. The project had been under way for some time so we were installing insulation, cement board, drywall and plastering.

The building style was completely the opposite of the Dominican. The units looked much like something you would see in the US but much smaller. Typically the units have two small bedrooms, one bath, a small kitchen area and a small living area for a family of 4 or 5. We visited one of the future resident's current apartment. It was a very small apartment in a Communist era building. Mold was continually growing on the walls and the residents had to paint the walls every month or two. The apartment was very damp and cold. The children slept in the kitchen and living area. Moving to a two bedroom home was very important as it would provide stability and safety for the children. We learned that the government paperwork required to take possession of the unit could take up to three years.

While working with Habitat Worldwide can be hard work, it is so worthwhile.

(Joseph Mohr (1792-1848), 1818)


Silent night, holy night!

#### Let's Build A Church

From the Abels in Brazil:

The reason for this letter is to ask for your **help** in a special project for a small but growing church located in Campo Mourão, the city where the Brazilian Lutheran Church work began in the 1960s. During our own ministry we were extremely blessed to receive cooperation from U.S. donors in building the four churches we planted in the metropolitan area of Curitiba. Now, we are **partnering with another congregation**—the Cohapar Church—to raise funds so they may have an adequate place of worship.

Their present church building was constructed many years ago and is now in **serious disrepair**. Termites have destroyed much of the wooden structure, the concrete walls are cracked, the ceiling is falling apart, and the space is no longer adequate for the number of people who meet there regularly.

The World Missions Board has approved this project, a modest **request of \$50,000**. With the help of interested individuals and churches, this goal can easily be reached—blessing the Cohapar congregation with **a safe, functional, and welcoming place of worship.** The members of the church will be doing much of the labor.

## Grace Historical Dates

1903 The pulpit we use today was retained from the original church (which had been renamed from The Norwegian Lutheran Church to the Immanuel Lutheran Church sometime before the split occurred in 1870).

The altar and altar rail we use today are from The Second Evangelical Lutheran Church. That altar had a picture on it which was replaced with Thorvaldsen's statue of Christ that we still see today.

The Young Ladies Sewing Society paid for the statue, the altar cloth, the carpet in the chancel, and the matting in the aisle.

The young people of the congregation had purchased a new pipe organ for the church by selling subscriptions. It was used until 1948.

The pipe organ was put in place and played for the first time at the dedication on May 15, 1904, by the seller, Carl Raugland, of Minneapolis.

The young people also paid for the large stained art glass window on the north side of the church.

The Ladies Aid Society paid for the large window on the south side of the church.

Captain Ole Oleson of Oshkosh, a former member of the congregation, gave the two stained glass windows near the altar.
